# Twelve Concepts for World Service: Concept 1

Concept 1 states: “The final responsibility and ultimate authority for AA World Services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole fellowship.” In order to grasp this concept it is necessary to know something of the administrative structure of AA World Services. Otherwise, the mechanisms that ensure that the administrative structure remains responsive to the group conscience make little sense.

Concept 1 is rooted in Tradition 2: “For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority - a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants. They do not govern.” Writing in 1962, Bill Wilson wrote: “Throughout the world today we are witnessing the breakdown of ‘group conscience.’ It has always been the hope of democratic nations that their citizens would always be enlightened enough, moral enough, and responsible enough to manage their own affairs through chosen representatives. But in many self-governing countries we are now seeing the inroads of ignorance, apathy, and power-seeking upon democratic systems. Their spiritual resources of right purpose and collective intelligence are waning.” This jaundiced comment certainly resonates today. That AA has heretofore been relatively free of this creeping malaise is a tribute to the wisdom of the founders when attending to the structural aspects of their organization. AA's service structure may seem cumbersome, but it does continue to reflect the membership as a whole in a way that few organizations, public or private, can match.

This Concept encapsulates a decision made in 1950 to establish a General Service Conference, and to make the Trustees of The Alcoholic Foundation (now the General Services Board of Alcoholics Anonymous) answerable to it. Prior to that, most of AA's decision-making emanated from the founders, Bill and Bob, who appointed the Foundation's trustees. The structure, such as it was, was invisible to the membership.

In 1948, Dr. Bob was diagnosed with a terminal illness. “The fact had to be faced,” wrote Bill, “that AA's founders were perishable.” Working in the face of an “If it ain't broke, don't fix it” mentality, the founders established the inverted pyramid of authority which we know in AA, with the bulk of authority resting at the bottom, in the groups and group members. As long as “ignorance, apathy, and power-seeking” get neutralized at that level, the entire structure remains healthy. Judging from my own experience and what people share at Oregon Area assemblies, power-seeking isn't much of a problem in an all-volunteer organization perpetually short on cash. Ignorance and apathy with respect to what it takes to run AA, on the other hand, are pretty prevalent. Too many people assume that working the steps and putting your dollar in the basket somehow make it all miraculously happen.

The General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous is entrusted with the routine conduct of policy and business affairs of AA. This board, established in 1938, consists of twenty-one trustees, fourteen of them chosen from among the membership and seven from outside of the organization. The seven nonalcoholic trustees are chosen by the General Service Board and confirmed by the General Service Conference. They serve two consecutive three-year terms. There are eight regional trustees, six from the US and two from Canada. Candidates for these positions are proposed at the area level and elected at the General Service Conference. In 2002 General Service Representatives at the Oregon Area Assembly voted on a candidate for Pacific Regional Trustee. Areas can also propose candidates for the two at-large trustees, who serve as delegates to the World Service meeting. There are also two Trustees representing AA World Services, and two representing The Grapevine. These are chosen by the respective corporate boards, and confirmed by the General Services Conference.

So how, exactly, does an individual alcoholic communicate his conscience to the General Services Board in New York? He can, of course, send off a letter or a flaming e-mail, possibly with somewhat more response than he gets out of his congressman. But if there's anything AA teaches us, it's that an informed group conscience is more reliable than one's immediate individual gut reaction. That group conscience communicates through your General Service Representative. If your home group doesn't have one, consider electing one, someone who will participate in Area assemblies. These are the people who meet periodically to determine area policy, and who elect the Area delegate to the General Service Conference in New York. Our Area Delegate visits Eugene periodically to give conference reports. When he says: "We confirmed so-and-so as trustee," pay attention. Were there (God forbid) to be some attempt at a power grab amongst the trustees, or some trend disagreeable to the fellowship, that would be the point at which to derail it.

If there is any moral to Concept 1, it's that responsibility and authority can only reside in the collective conscience of the fellowship if that conscience maintains its cohesiveness and keeps the lines of communication open.

Panel topics included Recovery, Unity, Service, Basics of the Home group, Media/Technology, Literature, Last but not Least, and What's on Your Mind? Each 1 1/2 hour panel consisted of four presenters each speaking on a given question within the panel topic for 10 minutes. This was followed by questions and comments from the floor. The presenters were those folks involved in the Pacific Region Area's service structure. The last panel, in Q& A format, was an hour in length. The questions were relevant to current issues in AA. I was learning so much that before I knew it I had 26 pages of notes and a new level of respect, understanding and love for our program and those people that care about its future. As I said, I'm a bit obsessed with service.

The panelists all did their homework and the questions that followed were thought-provoking. There was laughter and crying, and frequently a person just came to the mike to say that this was their first PRAASA and they were overwhelmed with emotion. I was told by the Oregon Area Alternate Delegate Erik K. that it was traditional to go up to the mike if this was your first PRAASA; he suggested I follow suit. So, when the discussion turned to 'The Use of the 12 Concepts in a Home Group', I took my turn at the mike, stating that it was my first PRAASA, and hopefully not my last. I also shared that at my Home Group we have a window shade display of the 12 Concepts that we hang next to the 12 Steps and 12 Traditions, reminding us that we have the Steps of recovery, the Traditions of unity, and the Concepts of service.

PRAASA was an incredible experience. I have shared this experience with those I come in contact with - my sponsees, my group, GSRs in the district, and just about anybody else I can. This has opened my eyes and my heart to service more than ever before. I feel a greater responsibility to this program and keeping it open to those who still suffer.

PRAASA 2006 is in Woodland Hills, California. This is the town in which I got sober, where I still have plenty of friends. I plan to attend even though my role as DCM ends in September. Nothing could stop me. This time I won't bother to bring the text books. I have couches to sleep on and panels to attend, sleep to miss and a few friends to meet. The best news is that in 2007, PRAASA will be in Portland. I have already signed up to volunteer in registration. Hope to see you there!

# PRAASA 2005

I know many folks are talking about the International Convention that passed recently, but my AA highlight of the year was PRAASA 2005. The 38th annual Pacific Region Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly was held this year in Tuscon, Arizona last March. As the District 19 DCM, I wanted to attend. Despite a busy academic schedule (it was the weekend before finals) I asked for my District's support. Much to my delight and surprise the GSRs came back with a unamous decision to finance sending me. So with a plane ticket and a rental car I left. The hotel in which the event was held was booked months previously, and I figured with a rental car I could find a cheaper hotel. If things were really booked I could even sleep in the car, but at least I was going to PRAASA.

Okay, I admit it - I am a service nut, a.k.a. a service junkie. From the time I started on this journey of sobriety until now I have always been involved in some form of service. Currently I have a service position in my home group, a volunteer position in H&I, and am District DCM. I am also a single parent, a full-time student, and even sometimes, when the weather is right, a hang glider pilot. Early on I was told that those who stay involved in AA service have a 90% chance of staying sober, and I liked the odds. I was so excited about attending PRAASA, where 1200 other service-loving folks would all be gathering from the nine western states for the largest service assembly I have ever seen.

The theme was "Basics of our Home Group - Recovery, Unity, and Service." The conference started on Friday at 1 pm and lasted until Sunday at 1 pm. The format included a short welcoming, then topic panels each followed by a floor discussion, a business meeting, a banquet, an AA meeting, roundtable reports, and a Delegates' ask-it basket on Sunday. On Friday and Saturday the panels ended at 9:45 pm, and the roundtable discussions started at 10 pm, lasting until midnight. I did not realize beforehand that this event was to be an experiment in sleep deprivation and that the school textbooks I had brought just came along for the ride.
